ITEM TITLE:

Public Hearing for Rezoning request by Magnolia Point Community, LLC for an approximately 9.14 acre property located northeast of the intersection of Peppers Ferry Road, N.W. and New Village Drive, N.W. (tax map no. 434-A-8A) from the A, Agricultural District to the R-3, Multi-Family Residential District with proffers. The property is designated as Residential on the Future Land Use Map of the 2013 Christiansburg Comprehensive Plan. (RZN 2019-06). The property is owned by International Church of the Foursquare Gospel.

DESCRIPTION:

The applicant requests to rezone the property located northeast of the intersection of Peppers Ferry Road NW and Village Drive NW (tax map no. 434-A-8A) from the A, Agricultural District to the R-3, Multi-Family Residential District with proffers. The applicant has submitted a corresponding application – which is contingent on the rezoning request – for a Conditional Use Permit to develop the property as a planned housing development consisting of apartments and townhomes.

Planning Commission held its public hearing on September 16, 2019. At its September 30, 2019 meeting, the Planning Commission recommended approval by a vote of 6-0 with the submitted proffers:

1. The property shall be developed in substantial conformance with the masterplan submitted dated August 6, 2019 and revised on September 10, 2019.
2. The property proposed for R-3 Zoning shall only be utilized for Townhome and Apartment residential use.
3. Construction traffic shall be strictly prohibited from Utilizing New Village Drive.

The Town Council public hearing was held October 22, 2019. At its November 12, 2019 meeting, Council voted to table action on the request and the applicant was requested to provide additional information regarding traffic data.

UPDATE:

After Council's action on November 12, 2019, the Christiansburg Engineering staff met with the developer and requested the developer and his engineer consultants (Balzer and Associates) perform traffic counts for the intersection of Walters Drive/Peppers Ferry Road and New Village Drive/Peppers Ferry Road. The developer subsequently met with American Electric Power (AEP) and determined a street connection from Bozeman Trail to Walters Drive - through AEP's property at 130 Walters Drive - was not achievable at this time, given AEP's entrance requirements to their substation.

Town Engineering staff further requested the developer conduct a traffic signal warrant analysis for the Peppers Ferry Road/New Village Drive intersection, which assumed a full build-out of Magnolia Point, Ivy Ridge, and New River Village. The traffic signal warrant analysis concluded a traffic signal was not warranted. The engineering consultants shared the traffic counts and the signal warrant analysis with town

Engineering staff. Town staff reported to the developer's engineering firm that they agreed with the methodology and findings presented in the study.

Given that the analysis showed the proposed development would create impacts on the intersection, the developer, after reviewing with Town staff, has proffered to construct a dedicated right turn lane on New Village Drive at the existing intersection with Peppers Ferry Road in order to mitigate impacts for residents of New Village Drive and Magnolia point. The addition of the right turn line will also position the intersection for future signalization, should it be necessary at a future point in time.

On June 4, 2020 the developer amended the proffer statement, adding a proffer which limits the development to no more than 72 units until such a time the property owner secures the land and issues a bond for a public road connecting Bozeman Trail to Walter's Drive.

The applicant has submitted a revised proffer statement, application, and plan drawings, along with the traffic signal analysis study. The revised proffers include:

1. The property shall be developed in substantial conformance with the masterplan submitted dated August 6, 2019 and revised on March 13, 2020.
2. The property proposed for R-3 Zoning shall only be utilized for Townhome and Apartment residential use.
3. A dedicated right turn lane shall be installed on New Village Drive at the intersection of New Village Drive and Peppers Ferry Road.
4. Construction traffic shall be strictly prohibited from utilizing New Village Drive to access the internal project site.
5. Housing units shall be limited to no more than 72 units until which time the property owner secures the land and issues a bond for a public road connecting Bozeman Trail to Walters Drive.

At Council's discretion, a motion to approve the rezoning request with the revised proffers should note acceptance of the revised proffers, with revised date of June 22, 2020.

ITEM TITLE:

Public Hearing for a Conditional Use Permit request – contingent on the preceding rezoning request - by Magnolia Point Community, LLC for a planned housing development to consist of multi-family dwellings and townhomes at a density of development of approximately 16 units per acre on property located northeast of the intersection of Peppers Ferry Road, N.W. and New Village Drive N.W. (tax map no. 434-A-8A) in the R-3, Multi-Family Residential District. (CUP 2019-09). The property is owned by International Church of the Foursquare Gospel.

DESCRIPTION:

The applicant requests a Conditional Use Permit to construct 146 dwelling units on an approximately 9.14 acre property in the R-3, Multi-Family Residential District. The proposed development, as presented on the conceptual layout plan, includes six apartment buildings consisting of 18 dwelling units, one apartment building consisting of 24 dwelling units, and fourteen townhomes.

In the R-3 zoning district, planned housing developments cannot exceed a density of development of 20 dwelling units per acre. The property is designated as Residential on the Future Land Use Map of the 2013 Christiansburg Comprehensive Plan.

Planning Commission held its public hearing on September 16, 2019. At its September 30, 2019 meeting, the Planning Commission recommended approval by a vote of 6-0 with four conditions:

1. The presented “Rezoning Application and Conditional Use Permit Application for Magnolia Point Planned Housing Development,” dated August 6, 2019 shall be considered as conditions of approval.
2. A five-foot wide sidewalk shall be installed along the western side of Bozeman Trail adjacent to the subject property.
3. A five-foot wide sidewalk shall be installed along the eastern side of New Village Drive adjacent to the subject property.
4. Right of way fifty feet in width shall be dedicated to connect the proposed Bozeman Trail to tax map number 434-A-13A (parcel ID 090210) prior to approval of a site plan for the development.

The Town Council public hearing was held October 22, 2019. At its November 12, 2019 meeting, Council voted to table action on the request and the applicant was requested to provide additional information regarding traffic data.

UPDATE:

After Council’s action on November 12, 2019, the Christiansburg Engineering staff met with the developer and requested the developer and his engineer consultants (Balzer and Associates) perform traffic counts for the intersection of Walters Drive/Peppers Ferry Road and New Village Drive/Peppers Ferry Road. The developer subsequently met with American Electric Power (AEP) and determined a street connection from Bozeman Trail to Walters Drive - through AEP’s property at 130 Walters Drive - was not achievable at this time, given AEP’s entrance requirements to their substation.

Town Engineering staff further requested the developer conduct a traffic signal warrant analysis for the Peppers Ferry Road/New Village Drive intersection, which assumed a full build-out of Magnolia Point, Ivy Ridge, and New River Village. The traffic signal warrant analysis concluded a traffic signal was not warranted. The engineering consultants shared the traffic counts and the signal warrant analysis with town Engineering staff. Town staff reported to the developer’s engineering firm that they agreed with the methodology and findings presented in the study.

Given that the analysis showed the proposed development would create impacts on the intersection, the developer, after reviewing with Town staff, has proffered to construct a dedicated right turn lane on New Village Drive at the existing intersection with Peppers Ferry Road in order to mitigate impacts for residents of New Village Drive and Magnolia point. The addition of the right turn line will also position the intersection for future signalization, should it be necessary at a future point in time.

Town staff also note that a connection from Bozeman Trail to Walters Drive (and subsequent cross-connection through Vinnie Avenue) remains a desired connection point and staff will encourage such connection be made if the property east of Magnolia Point is redeveloped. On June 4, 2020 the developer amended the proffer statement, adding a proffer which limits the development to no more than 72 units until such a time the property owner secures the land and issues a bond for a public road connecting Bozeman Trail to Walter's Drive.

The applicant has submitted a revised proffer statement, application, and plan drawings, along with the traffic signal analysis study. At Council's discretion, a motion to approve the conditional use permit with the conditions recommended by Planning Commission should amend the recommended conditions as follows, in order to capture the plan revisions proposed by the applicant:

1. The presented "Rezoning Application and Conditional Use Permit Application for Magnolia Point Planned Housing Development," dated August 6, 2019 **and revised March 13, 2020** shall be considered as conditions of approval.
2. A five-foot wide sidewalk shall be installed along the western side of Bozeman Trail adjacent to the subject property.
3. A five-foot wide sidewalk shall be installed along the eastern side of New Village Drive adjacent to the subject property.
4. Right of way fifty feet in width shall be dedicated to connect the proposed Bozeman Trail to tax map number 434-A-13A (parcel ID 090210) prior to approval of a site plan for the development.

ITEM TITLE:

Town of Christiansburg Community Development Block Grant Substantial Amendment to the 2019 Annual Action Plan in response to the COVID-19 pandemic (CDBG-CV)

DESCRIPTION:

The Substantial Amendment provides the Town a funding source to provide direct support over the coming months to agencies that will continue to address basic needs that have increased since the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic and economic downturn. This amendment is needed to receive and distribute the one time CDBG-CV CARES Act allocation of \$62,234. There are a number of rules that have been relaxed by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in order for localities to distribute funds to better address the significant effects of the crisis. Please see the attached memo for greater detail regarding this process and an overview of the town's CDBG program.

It is anticipated the disbursement would be approximately: 40% homeless prevention (mortgage/rental/utility assistance), 40% food security support, and 20% healthcare/ economic development support. In discussing with local providers, other non-profits (including in the faith community), and other entitlement communities, homelessness and food insecurity rise to the top as the two greatest immediate risks to the low to moderate income community. Access to routine healthcare is also a notable concern. There is also a discernible need in our community to support small businesses which provide so much economic vitality and jobs to the town's citizens. There is not a third party that has been identified as being able to support the distribution of economic development funds so the town would most likely act as the distribution agent. The limited CDBG-CV dollars may prevent the town from helping more than a few businesses without identifying one or more additional funding sources to address the true need of small businesses in our area. Please see the attached memo and proposed amendment for greater detail.

Councilwoman Sachs made a motion to adopt the resolution as presented, seconded by Councilman Huppert. Council voted on the motion as follows: Bishop – Aye; Hicks – Aye; Huppert – Aye; Sachs – Aye; Showalter – Aye; Stipes – Aye.

- C. Resolution to adopt the Annual Budget FY 2020-2021.

Councilman Stipes made a motion to approve the resolution to adopt the annual budget, seconded by Councilwoman Hicks. Council voted on the motion as follows: Bishop – Aye; Hicks – Aye; Huppert – Aye; Sachs – Aye; Showalter – Aye; Stipes – Aye.

- D. Resolution to appropriate budgeted funds for FY 2020 – 2021.

Councilwoman Sachs made a motion to approve the resolution to appropriate budgeted funds, seconded by Councilman Bishop. Council voted on the motion as follows: Bishop – Aye; Hicks – Aye; Huppert – Aye; Sachs – Aye; Showalter – Aye; Stipes – Aye.

- E. Appointment of Dr. Sharon Scott as at-large representative to the Montgomery Regional Solid Waste Authority for a four-year term beginning July 1, 2020. Al Bowman has asked to not be reappointed as the at-large representative after 25 years of service on the Board.

Mayor Barber reported that the recommendation to appoint Dr. Scott came from the Montgomery Regional Solid Waste Authority Board, and the appointment would be for a four-year term. Councilman Showalter made a motion to appoint Dr. Sharon Scott to serve a four-year term as at-large representative to the Montgomery Regional Solid Waste Authority, seconded by Councilman Stipes. Council voted as follows: Bishop – Aye; Hicks – Aye; Huppert – Aye; Sachs – Aye; Showalter – Aye; Stipes – Aye.

F. Discussion of potential immediate Town actions to alleviate stormwater issues in the College Street area.

As requested by Council on May 28, Town Manager Wingfield provided Council with a list of immediate actions the Town could take in regard to the College Street stormwater issues. Mr. Wingfield provided an overview of each action that would alleviate flooding in the College Street area until permanent measures could be taken. Council discussed the actions proposed and expressed caution with the option to work with FEMA to reassess Floodplain boundaries due to the potential negative consequences to homeowners in the area. Council expressed general support for the proposed immediate actions and agreed to hold a future work session to evaluate capital improvement projects to consider expediting urgent projects. This may also include a review of the Downtown Watershed Study findings.

G. Discussion of potential closed meeting in accordance with Code of Virginia § 2.2-3711 (A)(1) in regards to Town Council members and the Code of Ethics.

Town Attorney Reid Broughton reviewed Closed Meeting exemptions and noted that Council would be legally permitted to meet in closed session to discuss performance/discipline of public officers under Code of Virginia Section 2.2-3711 (A)(1), as well as Section 2.2-3711 (A) (4) that permitted discussions of personal matters unrelated to public business. Mr. Broughton stated that Council could compel member attendance, fine for disorderly behavior, or remove members for malfeasance. Councilwoman Hicks commented that per Councilwoman Sachs' email advising she had sought legal representation in the matter to be discussed, the matter was now a civil one and no longer a council matter. Ms. Hicks said there was no longer a need for a closed meeting and that the matter, if discussed by Council, should be done in open session. Mayor Barber said he supported an open session discussion of the matter, and Council agreed the discussion would be held in open session at the June 23 regular meeting.

IX. STAFF REPORTS

A. Town Manager:

- Reviewed the set committee meeting schedules
- Noted, in response to comments by Councilwoman Hicks, that Governor Northam's current Executive Order 65 prohibit the opening of bowling alleys at this time in Phase 2.

B. Town Attorney:

- Attorney Broughton offered to meet with members of Council regarding issues of concern related to Town Council and the Code of Ethics.

C. Other Staff:

- Finance Director Val Tweedie updated Council on the meals and lodging tax revenue for the month of May, which reflected a better outcome than anticipated due to COVID-19. Ms. Tweedie also reported on delinquent water bills and noted that the Town had contacted those customers encouraging them to reach out to the Town for a payment plan before water cut off begins June 24.

- Police Chief Mark Sisson and Rescue Chief Joe Coyle reported on ongoing activities and efforts of the New River Valley Public Health Task Force to address public health and safety during the COVID-19 pandemic.

X. COUNCIL REPORTS

- A. Councilman Stipes passed along the commendations of two citizens who appreciated the efforts of Town staff and emergency services personnel in their service to the Town during the COVID-19 crisis. He then recommended the council meeting for June 23 be moved to 6:00 P.M. due to the anticipated length of the meeting.
- B. Councilman Showalter recommended the Town reinstate the defunct Human Relations Committee, due to the current social climate, and to consider a more accurately descriptive name for the ad hoc committee.
- C. Councilman Huppert noted the efforts of Montgomery County Supervisor Sherri Blevins and the Parks and Recreation Department for efforts to recognize Christiansburg's graduating seniors, and encouraged everyone to seek ways through prayer and meditation to improve the current social climate, and strongly disagreed with any comments that Town staff and council were not supportive of the community.
- D. Councilman Bishop expressed appreciation for Town staff's efforts to support and serve the community on a daily basis, especially during this time of crisis.
- E. Councilwoman Sachs reported on the upcoming meeting schedules for the Christiansburg Public Art Advisory Board and the Central Business District Committee. She then expressed support for the "Christiansburg Strong" motto established on social media and proposed the Town provide decals for citizens, and encouraged the Town to seek ways to support the small businesses that have suffered during the COVID-19 crisis. Ms. Sachs then asked Town Manager Wingfield to contact Virginia Municipal League or ask the Town Attorney for advice regarding attorney/client privilege for elected officials.
- F. Councilwoman Hicks thanked Christiansburg Institute for the community outreach event held June 6, and she agreed with Councilman Huppert's comments that the Town should come together to pray for the community and country. She then thanked the Public Works Department for its work within the community, and thanked Parks and Recreation Director Brad Epperley for the care packages sent to Jill's Buddy Camp campers, since the camp has been cancelled due to COVID-19.
- G. Mayor Barber, no report.

The Town is anticipated to receive funding under the Cares Act thru an agreement with Montgomery County of approximately 1.6 million dollars. There are strict guidelines on how these funds may be expended. For FY 2020 we anticipate using approximately \$534,200 to recover costs incurred during FY2020. Costs incurred during the year include the additional 2 weeks of leave granted to employees as well as extended FMLA family leave. We may also recover employee costs for COVID 19 work that employees have been required to do that is substantially different then their normal functions, such as major cleaning and disinfection of facilities and attendance at various meetings for response to COVID 19. We will also be able to recover costs for PPE, disinfecting supplies, medical supplies etc.

CHRISTIANSBURG TOWN COUNCIL CODE OF ETHICS

The citizens of Christiansburg are entitled to fair, ethical, accountable, and effective local government. Such a government requires that elected public officials:

- **Comply with both the letter and spirit of the laws, ordinances, and policies of Town government.**
- **Be independent, impartial and fair in their judgment and actions.**
- **Use their public office for the public good and not for personal gain.**
- **Conduct public deliberations and processes openly.**
- **Act with respect and civility.**

- 1. Council Members shall work for the common good of the people of Christiansburg and not for any private or personal interest. They will treat all persons, claims, and transactions in a fair and equitable manner.**
- 2. Council Members shall at all times refrain from abusive conduct, personal charges or verbal attacks upon the character or motives of other members of Town Council, boards, commissions, committees, staff, or the public.**
- 3. Council Members duties shall be performed in accordance with the rules established by the Town Council. A Council Member shall respect a decision by Council once it has been made by the majority of Council.**
- 4. It is the responsibility of Council Members to share information that is relevant to any matter under consideration that they have received from sources outside of the decision-making process with all other Council Members.**
- 5. Council Members shall interact with one another honestly, forthrightly, truthfully, and respectfully. Discussions shall focus on issues, policies, and other substantive matters relating to the function of Town Government.**
- 6. Council Members shall respect and preserve the confidentiality of information provided to them concerning the matters of the Town. They shall neither disclose confidential information without proper legal authorization nor use such information to advance their personal, financial, or private interests.**
- 7. To the best of their ability, Council Members shall represent the official policies and positions of the Town Council. When presenting their own personal opinions or positions, members shall explicitly state that they do not represent the official position of the Council or the Town.**
- 8. Council Members shall support and maintain a positive and constructive environment for residents, businesses, Town employees, and others involved in**

Town activities. Council Members shall listen to concerns and requests by town residents and then pass that information to the Town Manager.

- 9. Members of the Council have the primary responsibility to ensure that ethical standards are understood and met, and that the public can continue to have full confidence in the integrity of Town Government.**
- 10. Members of Christiansburg Town Council have the responsibility to intervene when actions of any member or members appear to be in violation of this Code Ethics.**
- 11. The Code of Ethics shall be reaffirmed by majority vote of Town Council each annual reorganizational meeting, typically scheduled the first regular meeting in January.**
